I am making all things new. (Jesus— Revelation 21:5) Every church should be in transformation all the time. (Ken Priddy, workshop leader at the EPC General Assembly)

I am sitting in a very cool coffee shop called *ReNu*, which happens to be inside Ward Evangelical Presbyterian Church in Northville, MI, in the western suburbs of Detroit. Barb Searing and I have been here most of the week for the 36th annual General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church (EPC).

We've had an excellent adventure, and seemingly everywhere we turn we see the theme for this gathering, followed by the words of Jesus in Revelation 21:5—*RENEWED*... I am making everything new. Jesus' words describe an ongoing renewal. He's not talking about a renewal event (though those can be helpful) but a day to day process of becoming more and more like Christ. This is what Paul means in Philippians 2:12 - 13 when he writes, continue to work out your salvation ... for it is God who works in you .

Renewal is another way of saying *transformation*, and transformation is a big part of the EPC way of thinking. It's one of the four "strategic initiatives" found in the vision statement. The familiar phrase, *The only constant is change* reflects the fact that ongoing transformation is embedded in the very

nature of things—nothing ever completely stays the same.

This is also a basic component of the kingdom of God, seen in such Scripture passages as Philippians 1:6 (God, who began the good work within you, will continue his work until it is finally finished on the day when Christ Jesus returns .) and 1 John 3:2 (we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known .).

God's love for us is unchanging, no matter how much we may or may not change, but there is no question that the Lord wants us to change and to be renewed continually. We resist this, and we would usually rather not change. Complacency is a very attractive trap, and transformation can sound risky and scary, but it is what God has intended for his people and his Church.

One of the excellent preachers we heard this week, Davi Gomes from Brazil, said, *Your identity is not defined by who you were, or even who you are, but by what you will become*. Jesus came and died so that we could become like him, day by day. He now sits at the right hand of the Father, interceding for us and making all things new.

Session Highlights

At the June Session meeting on June 14th, elders:

*met at Ed Cline's home! It was great to be a full body this month.

*learned that the Vision Team surveys collected mountains of thoughtful opinions and comments, which the team is beginning to prayerfully digest and organize. The Vision Team is committed to sharing the collected information with the congregation in a transparent fashion, which will take a bit of time. They have approached Bud Koenig to help with the sorting of the information into an easier-to-share form, and meet again on June 27th. A time of prayer for our church is also scheduled for Thurs., June 30 at 6 pm.

*voted to do some flooring work in the cottage. The carpet in the living room, dining room and hall will be replaced with fresh carpet and pad; and the kitchen floor will be topped with new vinyl. Don and Perry's will provide labor, including moving and resetting furniture, and materials at a maximum cost of \$3100, which comes partly from the 'cottage fund' and partly from the remaining carry-over dollars from the 2014-15 budget. The floor, and even the joists under the floor, in the back bathroom/laundry area have sustained some serious water damage. That area is closed for now, and possible resolutions will be addressed toward the end of 2016.

*heard that bids are still being solicited for the proposed new garage.

*rejoiced with the mission committee for the many anonymous donations that are made to our various missionaries. We will welcome people from two programs we support with our mission budget soon: Kim Wilson, the director of God's Share Program (and also Phyllis Crossland's niece, and Sue and Don Crossland's cousin!) to share with us in worship on June 26; and Brian and Beth Schwartz from Wycliffe on July 3rd.

*agreed to support Community VBS at the Nazarene Church with a donation of \$100. Our adults and children are encouraged to participate during the early part of August.

*voted to support our youth and their friends who want to attend Camp Rejoice at Kirkmont by funding their registrations at 100%, which will cost \$3000. We are blessed to have the Weaver Camp Fund to supply \$2400 of this goal, and are requesting support from a scholarship fund that the camp maintains as well. Elders agreed to ask the congregation to consider donating to the Weaver Camp fund. The church also funded one scholarship for a youth to attend Youth For Christ (YFC) Junior High camp *put 'ice cream' on the calendar.....mixing on Tues., July 5 and freezing on Wed., July 6. The tent will be open Friday evening July 8th (the night of the parade) and Saturday, July 9.

*heard that the church will again host 5th Quarter parties for teens in our parking lot after home football games. The Congregational Life/Outreach committee is lining up partnerships with other area churches to support this project, which has grown greatly over 3 years. Dates are Fridays Sept. 2 & 9; and Oct. 7, 14 and 28 (off site). We are skipping the home game Friday, Sept. 16, which is Fall Festival weekend
