I can live for two months on a good compliment.

Two teams of short-term missionaries visited Thailand with very different strategies. One team saw their mission primarily as blessing people, while the other team saw their mission primarily as evangelizing people. These teams were being researched for a doctoral thesis and the researcher came up with a pretty stunning statistic: those who went with the focus of blessing actually had 50 times as many conversions as those who went with the focus of evangelizing!

Maybe it shouldn't be so surprising because it seems to be very much in line with what the Apostle Peter wrote in his letter (quoted above) and what Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount: let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:16) In his little book, Surprise the World, Michael Frost uses the acronym BELLS to spell out "five habits of highly missional people": Bless, Eat, Listen, Learn, Sent. He's found in his own church and in lots of other churches that this is a good tool for mobilizing Christians into living missionary lifestyles.

Frost suggests *blessing* at least three non-family members each week—one person from your church, one who doesn't attend any church and one from either category. He divides the blessings into three categories: *words of affirmation*, *acts of kindness* and *gifts*. Words of affirmation could be notes, emails, texts or simply spoken words. Acts of kind-

ness could be helping

someone move, offering to babysit, mowing a lawn, offering a ride, taking someone out for coffee or lunch, or any number of other things. Gifts could be a \$5 *Subway* card, a bag of garden tomatoes, a book, poem or whatever.

Even the smallest acts of blessing do two things: they make someone's day a little brighter and they can create opportunities to talk about Jesus. The most effective blessings are those freely given (echoing the words of Jesus: Freely you have received, freely give—Matthew 10:8). That is, blessings that are offered out of love (not mere duty) and simply with the purpose of blessing (not simply because we want to convert people). In Colossians 4:2, the Apostle Paul writes, Pray that God may open a door for our message—acts or words of blessing can be used by the Holy Spirit to crack the door open so that someone may hear the message of Jesus.

Maybe three people a week seems like too much right now. The point of blessing isn't to keep score (though setting a specific goal might help some people), it's to develop a habit of encouraging others that lines up with Jesus' description of his followers: You are the light of the world. (Matthew 5:14). As Michael Frost put it, We need to develop a rhythm of gift giving, time spending, and affirmation sharing as an end in itself because it fosters a spirit of generosity, it mirrors the character of God, and it alerts others to his reign.

The 4<sup>th</sup> century Roman emperor Julian feared that Christians would take over the empire. Why? Because their acts of kindness and their generosity were winning converts right and left. In a letter to his officials he wrote, ... the [Christians] devoted themselves to philanthropy. And they have gained ascendancy ... through the credit they win for such practices. May our practices of blessing and kindness and generosity gain ascendancy for our Lord Jesus. Shalom!

### **Session Highlights**

At the September 20th regular meeting, elders:

\*noted that, after making the final payment on organ renovation, there is still nearly \$13,000 in the organ fund; and, after paying to send seven kids to camp, there is still about \$1000 in the camp fund. We are blessed! \*

saluted treasurer Carol Razo (again!) for her thorough and prompt assistance on any and every Session request for information and action.

\*learned that the 321 N. Cherry St. property became the church's on Sept. 2. It is insured, and the utilities have been shut off. Demolition of that house and its garage, backfilling that lot, and removal of the cottage garage will be a package deal for under the estimated \$10,000.

\*heard that a work evening is scheduled Mon., Sept. 26 to pull some bushes, remove the basketball standard, and start emptying the cottage garage; the parking lot curb that has hung up a number of vehicles has been re-shaped; and the replacement alley door is ordered.

\*heard that Missions is sending \$500 to Louisiana flood relief and \$200 to the Hands of Hope fall fundraiser.

\*learned the chili booth at the Flat Rock had great participation from our members, gave our church great exposure, and netted about \$300. Thanks for cooking, Jane Nice. \*approved lending the Historical Society 2 risers for their Festival of Trees in November. Rhonda will be responsible for them.

\*supported a youth outing on Wed., Sept. 28th, organized by the Nice's. Thanks, Dave and Jane!

\*were reminded of the Special Congregational Meeting to be held Sun., Sept. 25th. Elder Ed Cline will present the request made by Pastor David Meriwether to retire/resign as minister of our church for congregational approval.

\*heard that the Nominating Committee is working on the slate of elders and deacons for the Class of 2019.



This is information from the newsletter that was received a short time ago:

Did you know that one of the most open groups to the gospel right now is young people? Furthermore, there is an ever-growing population of young Israelis immigrating to Berlin.

We felt burdened to reach these young people as they arrived in Berlin. This summer, the Lord made it possible to build a new team to open our Berlin branch. The gospel is already reaching those there who need it most. I am so encouraged with this progress

and opportunity. To me, that was more than enough to celebrate, but God had bigger plans! The ministry is growing and expanding in ways we can hardly imagine.

Due to the increase of ministry over the summer, and the decrease in summer giving, we now face a projected \$300,000 budget shortfall. ### VISION TEAM UPDATE

You may have noticed the Vision Statement which has been on the front of the bulletins the past few weeks and which will be on the on the front of subsequent newsletters:

A congregation of passionate and enthusiastic people who want to become more like Christ and live out their faith in the community.

Matt Reineck came up with this statement and the VT has adopted it for our congregation. A vision statement means nothing if it is not spelled out and lived out. So, beginning October 9, Pastor Dave will be preaching a three week series on the three parts of the statement: what it means to be a passionate

and enthusiastic Christian; what it means to become more like Christ; what it means to live out faith in Jesus in the community. He's preached about each of these things in the past year, but not consecutively, so this series will be a refresher on what the VT has been talking about and trying to communicate with our congregation.

One of the main things we talked about at our last meeting was regarding what we feel has been our biggest challenge: our congregation has become smaller and older and some in our church family are looking to the VT to "come up with a solution" for this situation. To some extent we on the VT have had the same expectation. We seemed to agree, however, that there is no "magic bullet" or quick fix to our situation (a situation to which about 80% of US churches can relate). On the one hand, we've affirmed that we're already doing lots

of good things in our community (individually and collectively). On the other hand, none of these things has resulted in more unchurched people coming to our church.

What we want to do, above all else, is to encourage each other to see ourselves as missionaries in our own community—as those who are gathered inside the church building to worship Jesus and then sent outside the church building to represent Jesus to those God sends our way. This is easier said than done, but it is what Jesus talked about when he said, You are the light of the world. (Matthew 5:14)
