OUT OF THE SALTSHAKER...

I have placed before you an open door that no one can shut. (Revelation 3:8) Not knowing when the dawn will come I open every door. (Emily Dickinson)

January comes from the Latin word for door, which seems appropriate for the month when we tend to look back on the year past and look forward to the year ahead. It was traditionally thought to be named after the Roman god Janus, whose statue has two heads--one facing backward and one facing forward.

An open door also faces forward and backward, but we generally think of it as symbolizing forward movement. An open door represents transition and also opportunity. When God opens a door He invites us to move into a new season, and much like the transition from December to January, we appreciate the season that is passing and look forward to the season that is coming.

Most of us don't like transition, but there is no opportunity without it. You cannot move where God wants you to move without leaving something behind. If you think of time as a corridor through which we pass, you know that no corridor in this world goes on forever--eventually you must come to a door.

God has placed an open door before our congregation. We don't know what's behind it, but we do know that God has opened it. And we know that He saw this coming back in 1989 when Bruce Becker left Paulding and moved to Philadelphia. That was another open door for our congregation. The Bruce Becker corridor was 9 years, and it was a very good time in the life of our congregation. The year 1978 was another open door, as Dr. Luchies moved to Holland, Michigan. The Dr. Luchies corridor was 13 years, and it was a very good time in the life of our congregation.

Only the Lord knows how long the next corridor will be, but we can be confident that it will be a very good time in the life of our congregation. "Very good", of course, doesn't mean lack of problems or challenges or transition pains. What it does mean is that the Holy Spirit has placed before us an open door, and as we walk through it we know that He walks with us every step of the way.

John 1:35-39 describes two of the first disciples meeting Jesus and deciding to follow him. Their first question is, Rabbi, where are you staying? Jesus does not tell them. His response contains no specifics. "Come," he replied, "and you will see." He places before them an open door, but he does not tell them exactly where it leads--he simply invites them to walk through. So it is with us. Are we ready to walk through this open door the Lord has placed before us? Shalom!

*approved <u>Pastor Dave's part-time schedule</u> through January 16th.


*learned that the <u>Vision Team has 'hit the pause button'</u> until May as we enter this period of transition.


