This Mother's Prayer by Marilyn Fry

My son, may I love you for what you are and not for what I might like you to be. May your dreams be yours and my dreams mine lest my dreams become your nightmares. May I be satisfied with my life so I can let you be satisfied with yours.

May I help you know that success is not always victory. Neither is failure always defeat. May I help you understand that God created man fallible. We should not despise our human condition. We need to accept ourselves and our weaknesses and accept Christ as our salvation.

May I help you get to recognize your enemies. Your most treacherous and devious enemies are within you. No man can destroy you in the way you can destroy yourself.

May I not endeavor to make your life so easy that you become too weak to stand alone. No man can stand steadily on rock which has been made too smooth. May I not make your life so difficult or your burden so great that you become unable to stand at all. Few men have the courage to face taking the roughened road that seems to lead only to bottomless places.

May I be ever aware that it is my responsibility to prepare you for separation from me. This is very difficult



for me for I would like to forever hold you to me, but this is not as God intended. In the end each man is responsible for his own self. As a mother, I hope and pray that I can help prepare you to carry that responsibility which rightfully must be yours to bear.

May I help you realize that love does begin with self-love. Self-love is not conceit. It is humility. When you know humility, you can love others as you love yourself and, above all, you can love God. Do not expect to know humility at all times. This is beyond the nature of man. Still, strive for it, for at those times when you are able to know something of it, you will know the ultimate of peace and fulfillment. Cherish this for it can sustain you when all else fails.

In loving, love life. Life is a gift from God. In living, do not fear death. Death is also a gift from God. It is not an end, but a new beginning.

I know that I may deny you many things. I pray that I will never deny you love. If I ever do, try to realize that I will first have ceased to love myself. Pity me if you must. Pray for me if you will, but do not try to join me in my self-made prison. No man can find himself by getting lost in someone else.

You are born of man but you are also born of God. God is love. Follow after love. Pursue it for it is good and lasting. Love is the very heart of all human value. It is love that gives life meaning and purpose. You are my child and I do love you. You are also God's child and God loves you always. God grant that I may help you grow according to His will.

Session Highlights

At the April 18th meeting, elders had a lengthy visit with Dan and Alex Straley from the Property committee. **Property topics covered and approved were:**

*3 ash trees will be removed, and 4 trees will be trimmed along Cherry St., and an additional tree will be removed from the lot where the garage will be placed. (\$1200 quote) Also on the subject of trees, one replacement tree will be placed in our Williams St parkway as part of the US 127 project last summer.

*the laundry/bath room in the cottage is being restored. The quote covers new subfloor; removal of the shower stall; extension of the countertop; removal, painting and reinstallation of the cabinets; use of the same sink and stool; improved insulation; and a plumbing access door. (\$7500 budgeted + linoleum)

*a camera and buzzer will be installed by the double doors on Caroline St. for security purposes. It is being explored whether an intercom can also be included. (\$1500 budgeted)

*the replacement garage was discussed at length. Session received and supports the concept proposed by the committee for a garage with a pavilion and a porch. This is subject to review by the finance committee, and then to an informational congregational meeting, which is now set for Sun., May 7th after worship. Ahead of the meeting, a display of drawings will be in the hallway by the coat racks, and Dan and Alex will be available to answer questions.

*Cleaning of the fellowship hall carpet was also covered. Session received this report as well as 2 estimates, and has delayed a decision on this item.

Elders also:

*learned of a coming change in the per member asking of the EPC. Over three years, it will move from \$23 per member to 1% of our operating budget. This appears to actually be a savings for our budget.

*heard from the deacons that one call was made to a sick/hospitalized member during March. Brent Fishbaugh is the 'visiting deacon' for April.

*approved the pulpit schedule for May as follows: 5/7 Dan Young; 5/14 Pastor Dwayne Richardson; 5/21 Dwight Stoller ("Come and See" Sunday); 5/28 Dave McMaster. The worship committee received approval to invite Pastor Dan Young to preach throughout June, if it is acceptable to the Presbytery.

*heard that the PNC has received 3 applications, and has had encouraging interviews with 2 of those people via Skype. They continue to meet every other Thursday evening.

Ethno Arts Workshop (April 10-12)

They say "a picture is worth a thousand words." Sometimes an art form—a musical performance, a drama presentation, a beautiful painting, a poem—can express the Good News in a new and dynamic way that captures the attention and imagination of the audience. Of course, the time will come when the message of Christ needs to be clearly delivered in the form of the spoken word based on reading and applying scripture.

God has given each people group ways of expression that they uniquely enjoy. This past week I (Ron) joined an EthnoArts team from our mission agency that conducted a workshop among the Manobo people to whom we have ministered throughout the years. The Manobo people already have the New Testament scriptures in their language, and many of you have partnered with us through your prayers and financial support to enable that to happen. But they also appreciate hearing of new approaches to spread the Good News of Christ to their fellow Manobos who are not yet believers.

As the twenty workshop participants learned how they can express their faith in new artistic forms, they became increasingly excited. In the three days we met together, they have already started to come up with songs, drama presentations, dances, art work, and even a media presentation to express their faith in Christ in their own language. They formed a committee to help review and refine future presentations and one group expressed an interest in having presentations in each Manobo village.

Again, we appreciate your prayer for work on *The Jesus Film* particularly concerning the following: Safe travel on a less familiar route which hopefully will be a bit shorter and less muddy, Fluent readers who will render the 26 "voice acting" parts with appropriate expression, Proper functioning of the recording equipment, Good weather, Cooperation of the whole community as they work together to produce and later use this film, Good visits and interactions with many old and new Manobo friends, God's peace, joy, and blessing.

(Watch for a viewing of *The Jesus Film* sometime in the near future here at our church. The Worship Committee has a copy of the movie and it is on our list of things to get sone soon.)
