Home Touch Sunday, Aug 20, 2017 Scripture Reading: Genesis 45:1-15 I was traveling recently by air from Portland, Oregon to San Francisco. As the time for boarding approached, I noticed that several passengers were showing sings of nervousness and stress.

They stood up and walked around. Then they sat down and fidgeted. They checked the passenger lists on an overhead monitor. Sometimes, they approached the gate agent to ask a question.

I soon understood that these passengers who showed so much anxiety were standby passengers. Their place on the plane was mot assured. Consequently, they were filled with dread and doubt, and in turn, they paced and fretted—until their fate was announced. Some got on the flight and some didn't.

Their worried behavior was in stark contrast to those who had boarding passes in their hands. They were about to take a flight and their seats were assured. These people were hopeful and expectant. They were relaxed and confident. They conversed amiably with fellow passengers and friends. They were excited, looking forward to the adventure that lay ahead at their final destination.

We, too, as believers are relaxed and confident. We've been assured a place on a flight for which God is our Pilot. We are excited and confident. We know that a place has been prepared for us, according to the gospel of John (14:1-2).

We have every reason to be confident. The Bible says that we can transfer our burdens and cares to Jesus. The Apostle Paul reminds us not to worry about anything but to submit our cares to God (Philippians 4:7). So there is no reason for believers to fret and worry about what lies ahead. We know that our lives are in god's hands, and what better place for them to be! -Timothy Merril

Session Highlights For July and August

The <u>Pastor Nominating Committee</u> left their 7/26 meeting to join the 7/26 Session meeting (just across the room!) to share their decision to extend a call to Ian Ferguson to become our next pastor. Since that night, Ian has accepted our invitation, and will return to Paulding the weekend of Sept. 15-16-17. He will be attending Presbytery on the 15th-16th, and will preach during worship on Sept. 17. A congregational meeting will follow that service, at which time everyone will hear the details of the offer, and those on the active member roll will vote on asking Ian Ferguson to serve our church as pastor. There will be formal announcements of this meeting, and a letter from the PNC introducing Ian, in the coming weeks.

The Worship committee was praised for filling the pulpit with inspirational and timely speakers. The August-September list was/is: 8/6 Dave McMaster, 8/13 Steve Heilshorn, 8/20 Dan Young, 8/27 Dave McMaster, 9/3 Ron and Donna Schumacher (Wycliffe missionaries), 9/10 Dwayne Richardson, 9/17 Ian Ferguson (pastor candidate), 9/24 Steve Heilshorn. On September 10th, church services return to 10:15 am praise singing and 10:30 am worship, with Sunday School at 9 am. Several more individuals are willing to be trained on the sanctuary sound system to provide back up to Jeff Summers and Joe Reineck. Steve Heilshorn will help with training.

The <u>Mission committee</u> is excited to have Schumachers, missionaries that we have supported for many years, use the Sept. 3rd service to share their work with Wycliffe Bible Translators in the Philippines. Light refreshments will follow so that people can visit with them more.

The <u>Christian Ed committee</u> has been working toward having the nursery open for business beginning Sept. 10 when we return to fall schedule. Session approved hiring Hartzog Lumber make some physical improvements. A nursery 'shower' was held Aug. 12th with many items donated. Guidelines for those volunteering in the nursery were shared by Dianna Karlstadt, who will serve as coordinator. Teen volunteers are in place to serve each week. Moms and grandmas are being asked to serve one Sunday between 9/10 and 12/ 31, so that one adult and one teen will be in the nursery each week. Sunday School will also kick off on Sept. 10th, with a theme of "Build Your Kingdom Here".

The <u>Congregational Life/Outreach committee</u> is exploring the purchase of a tall 'sail-type' welcome flag to be posted outside the Caroline Street doors each Sunday, as well as for other activities. They also plan to enlist greeters to welcome folks in the hallway by the coat racks each week. If you would be willing to do this on occasion, please let Barb Searing know. A new 5th Quarter season in our parking lot begins 8/25. Our partner churches this year are 8/25 1st Christian, 9/1 Nazarene, 9/29 is our own turn, and 10/6 St Paul Lutheran, with Branch Fellowship providing the sound each time. The Presbyterian Chili booth will again serve up yummy chili and bottled water at the Flat Rock Creek Fall Festival on Sept. 15-16-17.

The <u>Nominating committee</u> (Dave N, Matt, Judy R and Marlene B) will be seeking people to serve as elders and deacons soon. For Session, Ed Cline's one-year in the class of 2018 will be filled, plus one 3-year term for the class of 2020. (Barb Searing has agreed to serve a second term.). On the Board of Deacons, one 3-year term is up for renewal. (Jane Nice has agreed to serve a second term.)

The Property committee reports that the garage is going up. Thanks to the initial anonymous donation and financial support since then, the withdrawal needed from the Nicelley Investment Fund to complete the funding was \$16,000. This is well under the \$22,000 approved at the congregational meeting about the garage. Any additional donations received toward the garage can replace Nicelley principal that was withdrawn. There was a sump pump failure in the cottage basement as well as an air conditioning problem just before the Fergusons visited. The pump has been repaired (\$1750). The air conditioning could be repaired for \$1800, or, for \$2800, a new system with a 10 year warranty could be installed. It was decided at the July meeting that replacement was the wiser choice, and that perhaps we could delay that expense since fall is coming. However, with Fergusons coming again and hopefully staying in the cottage, it was decided to go ahead with this repair now. The security system for the ramp entrance door has been a more expensive challenge than anticipated, costing \$2700 vs \$1500 first planned. It is functioning, but the possibility of 'boosting' the wifi signal is being explored.

The <u>Daily Bread Food Bag</u> project, coordinated by Becky Fishbaugh, was funded through the end of 2017. These bags are not a 'food bank', but are back-up for emergency situations where people come to the church who have fallen through the cracks and need help.

<u>Narcotics Anonymous meetings</u> were approved to be held in the basement each Thursday evening. After a trial period of several weeks, it was decided to extend the agreement for 6 more months. Having these meetings available in Paulding is a huge support to Judge Beckman's Drug Court program. Dave and Jane Nice are the church hosts. Also related to Drug Court, it was approved to collect \$5 gift cards for Paulding businesses for the Drug Court reward basket during August.

It is time for <u>1st Wednesday suppers</u> to resume. Speakers from missions and community programs that we support will continue to be invited for the first several months.

Approval was given for a <u>Candidates Breakfast</u> sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. This will be held in our Fellowship Hall on Tuesday Oct. 3 at 8:30 am. We will also host a <u>Day of Prayer</u> for Andrew Brunson who has been in a Turkish prison for one year as of Oct. 7. The Prayer Shawl group will coordinate this. Watch for details.

The Second Chance Narcotics Anonymous group has been meeting in our church basement every Thursday evening since July. Attendance has grown and group members sincerely appreciate the comfortable space and our willingness to host. Session has approved continuing to host the meetings for another six months and will review the schedule again at that time.

Participation in Judge Tiffany Beckman's Drug Court has grown as well. Only those who have served jail time qualify for Drug Court and admittance is granted at the judge's and other legal officials' discretion. Attending support meetings is a requirement for Drug Court participants, so having local meetings is very helpful for those who do not have cars or valid driver's licenses.

A big THANK YOU to all of our church members who donated \$5 gift cards for the Drug Court reward basket in the month of August! The month isn't over yet and we already have over 20 gift cards. The judge will be amazed and the participants will be very grateful. Thank you for your generous donations to this cause!

Also, thank you to all of the members of our congregation who have offered to help open up the church and be here during the Narcotics Anonymous meetings. One of the participants recently marveled at how far he has come. "I can't believe I am talking to people like you, let alone in a church!" he told us. God is good!

On Oct. 7, 2016 Andrew Brunson and his wife, Norine, were summoned to a local police station in Izmir, Turkey. At the time, this didn't seem like anything to be worried about. The couple, originally from North Carolina, had lived for 23 years in Turkey's third largest city, where Andrew was the pastor of the Izmir Resurrection Church, a small protestant congregation of about 25. The Brunsons had raised three children in Turkey and had applied for permanent residency. They went willingly to the police station, thinking they were finally going to get it.

Instead, Andrew and Norine were taken into custody, accused of missionary activities "against national security," and told they would be deported. Norine was released on Oct. 9 and so far has been allowed to stay in Turkey, but almost a year later, Andrew remains locked up. On Dec. 11, he was moved to a counterterrorism center and charged with "membership in an armed terrorist organization." A judge ordered that he be detained rather than deported.

It will be a year on October 7 since Andrew Brunson was taken prisoner in Turkey. Session approved a day of prayer by our church for him and Norine on that Saturday. The church will be open twelve hours for prayer and there will be a sign-up sheet to come in person and pray or commit to pray at home at half hour intervals.
