## Out of the Saltshaker...

Be sure to set aside a tenth of everything. (Deuteronomy 14:22) Tithing isn't a financial issue. It's a Lordship issue. (Barry Cameron)

In the Christmas classic, *It's A Wonderful Life* there is a brief exchange between the movie's hero, George Bailey, and the angel who has been sent down to rescue him after he's jumped off a bridge. George is explaining that he jumped because he was distraught over the loss of a large amount of money from his business. The angel says, "Where I come from we don't need money." George's response is one of my all-time favorite movie lines: "Well, it comes in pretty handy down here!"

I think we'd all agree that money "comes in pretty handy down here", which is why probably most of us don't tithe. I don't know how much people give in our church, so I'm making an assumption based on a fact, and this is the fact: the average American church attender puts about 2.5% of his or her income into the offering plate. I realize that some people (including Patty and me) give some of their tithe to missionaries or to mission organizations, but it's also true that, in a typical American congregation, only 10-25% of people are tithers.

In the Old Testament, God's people were commanded to set aside a tenth (a "tithe") of everything they had and to dedicate that portion to the Lord. It was not only a matter of discipline; it was also a matter of worship. In the giving of their tithes, the Israelites were acknowledging God's sovereignty over everything in their lives.

trust and a mechanism for blessing. This is what Malachi 3:10 says, "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse. ... Test me in this," says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it." When we trust God enough to invest our money (and also our time and talent) into His kingdom, the reward is actually greater than the investment. This is what the Apostle Paul says in 2 Corinthians 9:6, 10 --Whoever sows generously will also reap generously. ... He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. This principle holds true in both the Old and New Testaments: whatever we give to God, He multiplies, and the blessings we receive in return are greater than what we invested.

So, here's a suggestion for a New Year's resolution: set yourself a goal to either tithe or to at least move in the direction of tithing. It's a big challenge for most people, but the blessings are even greater. It's true that money "comes in pretty handy", and it's also true that God doesn't need our money, because God doesn't need our money, because God doesn't need anything. But the Lord does desire to bless his people. He does this in many ways, and one of the most significant ways is through the discipline of tithing.

#### DRUG COURT REWARD BASKET

We have the privilege of supporting the Drug Court program (overseen by common pleas Judge Tiffany Beckman) through the supplying of a reward basket for the participants. This basket is in the entry hall right by the bulletin board. Dave Nice takes this basket (which contains 10 items) twice a month to the common pleas court. The items are \$4 - \$6 each, and include things like: candy bars, pop, Gatorade, shampoo, lotion, gift cards (Chief, Subway, Marathon, McDonalds, Dairy Queen), etc. You can place items in the basket anytime, just as you would for the food pantry basket.

# JEWS F R JESUS

We are so grateful for the birth of our messiah; amidst the holiday hubbub, we wanted to encourage you with how the Lord's plan for his people is effecting spiritual transformation worldwide through Jews for Jesus missionaries.

I'd like to share with you a special story about a man named Tom. Mark who works with us in Sydney, Australia has been ministering to Tom for some time. Though he lives in Sydney, Tom was born in Berlin and remembers *Kristallnacht* as a young boy. His father was a doctor on a major street. Seeing the riot coming up the street, his fa-

ther quickly thought to remove the required notice (that this was a Jewish practice) from the front of the building the practice was located in, before the riot got to them. They lived above the practice.



They had already applied for

papers to leave Germany, but realized they could not wait for the proper papers and had to leave immediately. They got as far as the border of China and Russia and were stopped by the Japanese.

The authorities at the border crossing yelled at them, made them wait a long time, yelled some more, and then waived them through. The authorities knew if they were turned back, it would spell their death. Tom is to this day ever so grateful for the mercy shown them at that border crossing.

Tom studied in English and Russian in Harbin (China). Later the family moved to Israel, where he met his wife. He worked hard and earned another degree, this time in Hebrew. Later they migrated to Australia.

Mark first met Tom just after Mark had been praying for more Jewish people with whom he could share Messiah. Mark met Tom on the footpath in front of our shop. He was soft spoken but showed a real openness to Jesus. Mark was so glad for this immediate answer to prayer.

It took a while to first get together. Since that first visit with Tom, he and Mark had numerous meetings and

talked about being Jewish and believing in Jesus. They continue to read and discuss relevant Bible passages. Mark remembers well explaining how Yeshua suffered for everyone's sins. Tom replied, 'That doesn't seem fair.' Mark replied it wasn't fair to Yeshua, but it is our only hope, the only way our sins can be forgiven and for us to be right with God.

Tom recently prayed with Mark to receive Yeshua as his Messiah. Please pray that Tom grows strong in Yeshua and in his knowledge of the Bible.

Our Lord, born so many years ago in a humble setting and city in Israel, is moving His people all across the world, calling them to Himself.

Jews for Jesus is able to equip missionaries to do this good work through friends like you. <u>We covet your</u> <u>prayers and support in this endeavor to bring</u> <u>Jewish people to their Messiah.</u>

#### A Little Boy's Explanation of God:

"Atheists are people who don't believe in God. I don't think there are any in Chula Vista. At least there aren't any who come to our church.

"Jesus is God's Son. He used to do all the hard work, like walking on water and performing miracles and trying to teach the people who didn't want to learn about God. They finally got tired of him preaching to them and they crucified him, but he was good and kind, like His father, and He told His father that they didn't know what they were doing and to forgive them and God said O.K.

"His dad (God) appreciated everything that He had done and all His hard work on earth so He told Him He didn't have to go out on the road anymore. He could stay in heaven. So He did. Now He helps His dad out by listening to prayers and seeing things which are important for God to take care of and which ones He can take care of Himself without having to bother God. Like a secretary, only more important.

"You can pray anytime you want and they are sure to help you because they got it worked out so one of them is on duty all the time.

"You should always go to church on Sunday because it makes God happy, and if there's anybody you want to make happy, it's God!

"Don't skip church to do something you think will be more fun like going to the beach. This is wrong. And besides the sun doesn't come out at the beach until noon anyway.

"If you don't believe in God, besides being an atheist, you will be very lonely, because your parents can't go everywhere with you, like to camp, but God can. It is good to know He's around

you when you're scared, in the dark or when you can't swim and you get thrown into real deep water by big kids.'

"But...you shouldn't just always think of what God can do for you. I figure God put me here and he can take me back anytime and...that's why I believe in God.

• If anything comes into your mind, write it down: it doesn't have to be a specific outreach idea (though that would be nice)--it could be a phrase or a picture or a scripture

• Do this every day until our next meeting and we'll see what everyone has to

report
