A lot of you know that I spent my last semester of college in Europe. There were 40 od us, and even though our school wasn't Christian, part of our protocol was to elect a group chaplain and I was chosen-perhaps because, due to my very long hair, I bore the most resemblance to Jesus (though I'm fairly certain he wasn't blonde).

The thought of becoming a pastor was completely off my radar back then, but I was a very serious Christian. But apparently, not too serious, because I was told be a few of the guys one evening that, even though I was leading a Bible study in my room, I wasn't, as they put it, "like the God Squad". My best friends were iun the "God Squad", but I took that as a compliments (again, maybe it was the hair and the beard).

Jesus was a one man God Squad, but the gospels clearly indicate that he wasn't at all like the religious people of his day. The Scribes and the Pharisees definitely had a love-hate relationship with our Lord: they *loved* to hate him! A big part


of this is that they understood Judaism backwards and forwards, but they didn't understand the kingdom of God as Jesus described it – and Jesus described it over and over again.

His most concentrated description is in the Sermon on the Mount, which takes up all of chapters 5—7 in the book of Matthew. It is the largest collection of Jesus' teaching in all of the gospels, and though there are a variety of topics covered, an overall theme emerges which is summed up in the *exact center* of the Sermon: **Do not be like them** (Matthew 6:8). He was specifically referring to **pagans** (v.7), but this exhortation to be different can apply to all ways of thinking and living which are at odds with the kingdom of God, whether they happen to be religious, irreligious or anything in between.

Followers of Jesus are supposed to be different. Not necessarily weird, but definitely different. Not different in the sense that we stay clear of anything non-Christian, but different in the sene that we can shine light in the dark places, which, as Jesus says near the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount, is both our privilege and responsibility. We're not to be different just to be different, but to be like Jesus.

So, when I get back from vacation, I'll start preaching through this wonderful teaching on Christian counterculture that Jesus has given for us who would follow him - for anyone who would walk a different path in this world, which is the path that he himself walked.

Session Highlights

At the July Session meeting, elders: *were pleased to learn that the cottage flooring project has been completed under budget. Some old termite damage discovered under the flooring under the refrigerator was repaired in the process. All the money remaining in the cottage fund will be used on this expense, and that fund will be deleted. Future needs at the cottage will be taken from the property fund. The balance for the flooring will be taken from remaining carryover funds from 2014 into 2015.

*set a date for a special congregational meeting on Sun., Aug 7th after worship. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss and vote on the possible purchase of the house at 321 N Cherry St. (see separate article).

*heard from the property committee that a quote is being received from Hartzog Lumber to replace the alley door into the fellowship hall; that an outdoor work day will be held to pull some dead bushes, remove the basketball hoop, and seal the sign along the highway; and that 2 bids have been received on the proposed garage project. No action will be taken on the garage until a decision is made on the possible purchase of the house at 321 N Cherry St.

*learned that the ice cream tent grossed about \$1200, despite the post-parade downpour, and that we sold out of ice cream for the first time in recent memory! Proceeds will be used to cover the cost of ingredients and supplies (~\$250); to pay for materials for Paul Punches to repair the wagons that hold the freezing equipment (~\$350); and to pay the Women's Board for the sale of their root beer floats and brownies (~\$250).

*approved youth outings once a quarter for our young people and their friends using youth group funds. Dave and Jane Nice have offered to coordinate and plan these events.

*were reminded of July 31st being a 5th Sunday. The 5th Sunday offering will go toward the Agape Fund; and our church is responsible for worship at The Gardens that day.

*went into executive session to discuss personnel matters.

These are highlights of the most recent meeting. It was suggested in Vision Team surveys that some would like to read more detail about Session meetings in the newsletter. In response to that suggestion, after the full minutes of the July Session meeting are formally approved at the August meeting, they will be available by email through the church office on request. Congregational Meeting

There will be a special congregational meeting on Sunday, Aug. 7 after worship. The purpose of the meeting is to share information about, and vote on, the proposed purchase of the property at 321 N. Cherry St.

When this house on the northwest corner of 'our' block went on the market this spring, Session gave the property committee authority to explore the possibility of purchase within certain limits. Any agreement reached was to include a contingency clause that a congregational vote was required.

The Session's thinking is that we should consider this purchase while the land is available, with the plan being to tear down the buildings, and to create green space and options for the future. In May, an offer was made and rejected with no counter-offer. Last week, the sellers reduced the price, and another offer was made by the property committee. This offer has been accepted.

The finance committee will be meeting before the Aug. 7 congregational meeting to make its recommendations on the details. The final decision on this (and all matters related to purchasing property) rests with the congregation. Thus, the meeting on Sunday, Aug. 7.

Anyone can attend a congregational meeting; only members can vote. If the purchase is approved, closing and possession would be Sept. 2.

New Swell Box for the Organ



These pictures of the new swell division were sent from the workroom of Lima Pipe Organ Co. The first photo shows the new expression box and shutters. The second photo shows the pipes, including the new open bass pipes for the 8' Geigen Principal and 8' Salicional. These pipes had to be "mitered" to fit into the available space. Mitering involves cutting the pipes at a 22 1/2 degree angle and soldering the pieces back together to "bend" the pipe.

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


I have tried to ask myself what I remember from the first year, and it is sketchy. Phyllis Stiver was head of the Women's Board at that time and the force behind our original few retreats. I remember the two of us being in the sanctuary on the Friday night before; laughing, cleaning, decorating and praying. We were fearful about the results of our planning, never dreaming that the retreats would still be going on in the next century. I have no idea who the speaker was, and can find no record of the name or topic, but I know that Susan (Mayer) Kayser was here to play piano, that we opened with "This is the Day" and closed with "Jesus, Name Above All Names." I know that the lunch was delicious not because I remember what it was or who fixed it, but because they have all been great - and that the noisiest time of the day was when we ate together, celebrating our oneness as women in the Lord.

I know that our beginning was joyous and full of love, that we met women we had never known before. Some of those women have never missed a retreat, some had never missed until the Lord took them to Himself, some have come once or twice and drifted away from our midst. All of us have aged. I do know that no one went away disappointed on the day of our retreat.

We are now planning for the 35th Retreat. It is happening Saturday October 29th. Mark your calendars for a time of refreshment in Him. We have begun to think of ourselves as the Women at the Well, drinking in the Living Water that gives us life. Watch for more next month!

Financial Tidbits:

Update on finances: in June we paid the 2nd half of the property taxes, plus we paid \$2,131.75 to Landscape Supply for yard maintenance.

From January 1 to June 30, our projected income was \$74,604.90, actual income was \$73,517.94 leaving us 1,086.15 short for the first half of the year.

The organ fund received enough money to cover the current repair, with some to carry over to future expenditures. Exact figures next month.

Now she's a school teacher with a burning desire to help others learn to read in their language and to use the translated Scriptures. While they were here, plans were discussed for two major efforts:

1) An ethno arts workshop in the Manobo area to encourage them to use their cultural heritage for praising the Lord, especially music. This is on the calendar for October.

2) Dubbing the Jesus Film into Manobo. The initial work of preparing the script is scheduled for August 1-12. Teams from several languages will be doing this together in Manila, and Ron and I

will be there as consultants.



He has given. I let my pupils listen as I read the first part of Luke chapter 1 in Manobo. It was great reading and the pupils were very attentive. They were not only able to answer why/what/where/why/ how questions, but they also got values which they applied after our lesson. May this continue and may they apply the values they have learned. 
