OUT OF THE SALTSHAKER . . .

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests. (Luke 2:14)

As long as a man is alive and out of hell, he cannot have any cause to complain. (Charles Spurgeon)

Esther 4-5 gives the account of Queen Esther risking her life on behalf of her people. The king had been talked into issuing an edict authorizing the annihilation of the Jews, and Esther's uncle Mordecai had urged her to go to the king and plead with him to spare them (he did not know she was a Jew). The dilemma she faced was that no one was allowed to approach the king without an invitation. Anyone who did so would be put to death. There was only one exception to this law: if the king extended his gold scepter to the one approaching him, that person's life would be spared.

Esther decided to approach the king. She asked her uncle to gather all the Jews in the royal city to fast on her behalf for three days, while she herself fasted. She said, When this is done I will go to the king, even though it is against the law. And if I perish, I perish. (Esther 4:16) On the third day she went to the king and he extended his scepter toward her and her life was spared.

This remarkable incident, recorded almost 500 years before the birth of Jesus, is a powerful illustration of what the choir of angels sang out on the night he was born: **Peace to those on whom his favor rests**. According to the law, Esther should have been put to death, but her life was spared when

the king extended his scepter, because the scepter was the sign of his favor resting on her at that moment. In other words, the extending of the king's scepter toward Esther indicated that there was peace between them.

The peace that Jesus made possible by his birth, death and resurrection is the freedom of anyone who trusts in him to approach the King of the universe without being put to death. It is the peace of God's favor, which is the difference between living and dying.

Charles H. Brent wrote, Peace comes when there is no cloud between us and God. Peace is the consequence of forgiveness, God's removal of that which obscures His face and so breaks union with Him.

Union with God is the essence of peace—to be face to face with Him is the fundamental desire of all people. This is possible because, through His Son, the King has extended his scepter of grace and by doing so has offered his favor. And that favor rests on those who have put their trust in Jesus as Lord and Savior.

At the November 15th Session meeting, elders:







Drug Court Angel Tree

Our church's involvement with the Paulding County Drug Court program began after the Vision Team reached out to community leaders about the needs in our area. Judge Tiffany Beckman had just started this program and was thrilled with our willingness to help. We supply rewards like gum, shampoo, and beef jerky which the participants can choose from a basket if they are 100 percent compliant with the program for that time period. Drug Court meets twice monthly.

Most of the participants in Drug Court have nothing. They are struggling to stay sober while finding jobs, getting drivers' licenses, and paying court costs. Many of them have children, but few have custody. A big part of their on-going recovery is rebuilding relationships with their children and their children's guardians.

Our church would like to help them provide 1-2 Christmas gifts for their children FROM THEM. If you would like to shop for a child, take an angel from the tree by the bulletin board in the hallway, buy the gift(s), and return them under the tree in a bag with the angel attached.

Do not wrap the gifts.

A Voice in the Midst of Silence



Now it was our first day, a debrief in Granada and some of my team and I decided to go and explore what the market had to offer in the town square. We spent a couple hours just shopping around at the different stands and tables. The girls I was with stopped at a table for a while

and I continued to look around. Now at this time I was wearing my Detroit Tigers Baseball hat, and if you don't already know, Baseball is actually the national sport of Nicaragua, which is pretty dang cool. And at the table next to where the girls were, one of the locals who I quickly realized was mute, (Referred to as Nicas) motioned me over and pointed to my hat and started motioning that he played baseball. And so in what I would call very broken sign language, we had a conversation for 10 minutes about baseball. We then left and did some more looking around, and in my mind, I figured I would never see the man again.

Well I was wrong and have never been more joyful in being wrong. Later on as we were walking back to our hostel, he recognized me and came up and gave me a hug. I was honestly surprised, but so ecstatic that he felt we made a good enough connection to call me out and give me a hug. He then started to explain

that he not only was mute, but also deaf and the pointed to heaven and then to his heart and then praying hands and wanted us to pray over him right there. And so we prayed for healing for restoration of his hearing and speech. He somehow knew we were Christians and would pray for him, and there is so much joy in that.

Over the next couple days of our time in Granada we got to know our new friend who is named Juan and got to know his story and about how when he was little and living on the streets, an American missionary took him in and taught him American Sign Language and poured into him and his faith journey. He then began to take us around town and tell us stories about each of the homeless people lying on the side of the streets and asking us to go and pray for them right then and there.

I was absolutely blown away by this man. He is a deaf and mute guy who is filled with so much joy, taking us, a group of missionaries around his community telling us the stories of his people and taking us to pray over them. That's not normal, but so amazing! We also then asked him to join us for all squad worship one evening. I wasn't sure what that experience would be like for him being that he could not hear. But as we were all singing praises to the



most high God, I look over at Juan and he just has his hands raised and crying. I then had tears in my eyes as I was overcome by the joy and the presence of the Holy Spirit in that place and in Juan's life.

But I do believe that God has given Juan a much larger voice than any one of us could have. God gave him a voice in the midst of his silence through the amount of love and care he has for the disabled in his

city. God gave him a voice for the people that can't speak up for themselves. God has given him a heart to tell their stories to us and take us to pray for them. It is in that, that he indeed has a voice and a beautiful voice at that.


Prayer Requests:
