Planning for Paulding from Ian Ferguson

Since I walked across the stage last spring to receive my diploma from Denver Seminary, I have been asked one question over and over. Professors, family, and friends have inquired, "What are your plans?" Now that they have heard that we are moving soon, a new round of the question is being asked. I know they ask because they care and we are excited to share our plans with them.

Plans are good. Well, at least that is what my wife often tells me. I have had to learn the value of planning in my life. School, work, projects, hobbies, relationships, and now our son require our planning. Because of this, my wife and I take time each week to plan everything that needs done. At the moment, lots of planning revolves around our move to Paulding. We all plan and we all need to learn how to plan wisely. A good start is evaluating my plans.

You may have heard of the old Yiddish adage translated something like "Man plans, and God laughs." Though this is not a quote from the Bible, similar ideas are found in Scripture. In Psalm 2:1-6, God laughs at those who conspire against Him. Those that plan rebel-

lion against God are doomed to fail because God will not be thwarted. First, we should evaluate our plans, even those plans we make in our heart, for intentional sin. Are we planning on placing ourselves in compromising situations? Are we planning to work against those God has put in authority over us? Evaluate our plans according to their devotion to God.

Most of us would not find many intentional sins in our planning. Yet, we despair when our plans do not work out. We are overwhelmed with anxiety when our priorities are not fulfilled. Second, we should evaluate our plans for including God. In James 4: 13-16, James criticizes those who arrogantly make plans that omit God. Instead, they should allow room for God in their plans. If God wills, then their plans will succeed. Evaluate our plans according to their inclusion of God.

Alissa, Samuel, and I are excited to move forward with planning this new season of our lives with you all at First

Presbyterian Church. We are planning with the hope that moving, tests, paperwork, and meetings go smoothly. We put these plans into God's hands. We plan to work diligently with those God has put in authority over us. We plan to make room for God in our plans, whatever may come. In this newsletter, you will see a general timeline that we are working through. God willing.

We would like to thank the congregation for their warm welcome! We are excited to be part of First Presbyterian Church and the community. Session Highlights

At the Sept. 19th Session meeting, elders:

*heard that the nominating committee has filled the slate of officers for the coming year. Elder Barb Searing accepts a second 3-year term; Bud Koenig will begin a new 3-year term; and Darwin Cline will fill the remaining one year of Ed Cline's term. Deacon Jane Nice accepts a second 3-year term; and Darla Cline will begin a new 3-year term. These officers will be elected at a congregational meeting in November, and ordained/installed during a worship service in December. The dates will be set in October.

*discussed concerns over giving. It was explained that the General Fund is still okay, as we are not paying a pastor salary at this time, but that we are not as far ahead as might be expected during this time.

*voted to finish the upgrading of ceiling lights to LED at a cost of \$2450. The first half of the project was done last year.

*thanked Rhonda for deep-cleaning the cottage; and Barb for attending the Midwest Presbytery meeting with Ian and Alissa Ferguson. Barb reported the Fergusons met with the chairmen of the Ministerial and Candidate Care committees that day.

*heard that the preachers for October will be Dan Young (1st, 8th, 22nd and 29th), and Pastor Dwayne on the 15th.

*were reminded that the Women's Group is hosting several community events: Meet the Candidates breakfast on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce Tues., Oct. 3rd at 8:00 am; the Women's Retreat Sat., Oct. 28; and the Women's Ecumenical Potluck on Thurs., Dec. 7th at 6:00 pm.

*learned that the NA meeting attendance has grown from an average of 6 to 15 with our basement as a regular place to meet. More furniture was added by Nice's to accommodate everyone.

*complimented the Property Committee on the garage, which is complete except for the clean-up/yard work. There will be a work day to move things from Straley's and Nice's barns. Funds are still be accepted to replenish the Nicelley Investment fund from which \$16,000 was withdrawn.

*were glad to hear that the chili booth was a success, with proceeds going toward missions; and that the

nursery has had children each week since it reopened.

*listened to a presentation by Adam Vance about MERGE, a new ecumenical youth effort in Paulding. Elders delayed committing to this until our new pastor is here.

Financial Update

During August we made the following payments:

- Hartzog Lumber in the amount of \$530.00 for upgrades to the nursery
- Kirkmont Center in the amount of \$1,700 for 5 children to attend Camp Rejoice
- Classic Land Design in the amount of \$1,401.13 for mowing and mulching
- Derrick Clellan a total of \$15,300 for concrete work on the garage project
- Habbegger Ace Lumber in the amount of \$5,705.20 for garage project materials
- Sam U Schwartz a total of \$9,600 for garage project labor

We also cashed in \$16,000 from the Nicelly investment and transferred \$5,943.62 from the Nicelly income fund to help pay for the garage project. (This was approved at a congregational meeting on May 7, 2017)

Pastor Ian!

The congregation of First Presbyterian Church called Ian Ferguson to serve as our next pastor at a Congregational meeting on Sept. 17, 2017. The vote was 44-0.

As eager as we all are to have Ian and his family in Paulding, there are still procedures to be worked through. Here are the exciting details as we know them to date:

When Fergusons got home on Tuesday, Sept. 19th, Ian gave his two-week notice at his job in Denver, and the family also gave their one-month notice on their apartment lease. Ian and Alissa are exploring moving options for their belongings, which may

arrive in Paulding well before they do, and could be stored in the cottage or garage.

- 2) Ian's transfer from the EPC Presbytery of the West to the EPC Presbytery of the Midwest has been requested. Ian's candidate care toward ordination will be in the Midwest Presbytery.
- 3) Ian still has a paper exam to take related to ordination in the EPC. He must also complete a psychological exam. The doctor to administer this psychological test is in Ian's current Presbytery, and must be approved to administer this test by Midwest Presbytery's Candidate Care committee.
- 4) Ian and Alissa plan to leave Denver in about 2 weeks, driving to visit Alissa's grandpa in Iowa along their way to Ian's parents' home in Illinois.
- 5) Fergusons will live with his parents in Illinois while Ian studies for his paper exam. I'm sure it will be no sacrifice for these grandparents to have baby Samuel around for a few weeks! The plan is to study during October and take the test in early November here in the Midwest Presbytery. It is strongly recommended by Presbytery that the test be completed before Ian assumes his duties here, so that he can give full attention, first to the test and then to his new pastoral duties.
- 6) Once the test has been taken and scored, Ian can be hired as a 'stated supply' pastor and begin serving here while the ordination process rolls out.
- 7) With all the testing and moving and transferring from one presbytery to another, and realizing that neither he nor we have much control over the timing, Ian's guess/hope is that he will be in Paulding, at the latest, the first of the year; and at the earliest the end of November. It will all be in God's good time.
- 8) It is anticipated that Ian will be examined on the floor of Presbytery at the February meeting, which is Feb. 16-17, 2018 in Greenville, OH.

Your faith and trust in us through God allowed us to endure this process and complete our task. We praise God for HIS hand in everything As the choir sang: "We are the Church"! and we all sing: We will "Build your Kingdom here"!!

Now here we are waiting again - - - tests, transfers, more paperwork and details, moving, etc. but the end AND the beginning are now in sight. It's all in His time. Remember - by perseverance the snail reached the ark!

On Oct. 7, 2016 Andrew Brunson and his wife, Norine, were summoned to a local police station in Izmir, Turkey. At the time, this didn't seem like anything to be worried about. The couple, originally from North Carolina, had lived for 23 years in Turkey's third largest city, where Andrew was the pastor of the Izmir Resurrection Church, a small protestant congregation of about 25. The Brunsons had raised three children in Turkey and had applied for permanent residency. They went willingly to the police station, thinking they were finally going to get it.

Instead, Andrew and Norine were taken into custody, accused of missionary activities "against national security," and told they would be deported. Norine was released on Oct. 9 and so far has been allowed to stay in Turkey, but almost a year later, Andrew remains locked up. On Dec. 11, he was moved to a counterterrorism center and charged with "membership in an armed terrorist organization." A judge ordered that he be detained rather than deported.

It will be a year on October 7 since Andrew Brunson was taken prisoner in Turkey. Session approved a day of prayer by our church for him and Norine on that Saturday. The church will be open twelve hours for prayer and there will be a sign-up sheet to come in person and pray or commit to pray at home at half hour intervals.
